Independent Auditor's Report

To the Board of Directors
Regional Refuse Disposal District One

Opinions

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities and each major fund of the Regional Refuse Disposal District One, as of and for the year ended June 30, 2025, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the Regional Refuse Disposal District One's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the governmental activities and each major fund of the Regional Refuse Disposal District One, as of June 30, 2025, and the respective changes in financial position, and the respective budgetary comparison for the General Fund for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Basis for Opinions

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are required to be independent of the Regional Refuse Disposal District One and to meet our other ethical responsibilities, in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to our audit. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinions.

Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America and for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the Regional Refuse Disposal District One's ability to continue as a going concern for twelve months beyond the financial statement date, including any currently known information that may raise substantial doubt shortly thereafter.

Auditors' Responsibility for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinions. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and *Government Auditing Standards* will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control. Misstatements are considered material if there is a substantial likelihood that, individually or in the aggregate, they would influence the judgment made by a reasonable user based on the financial statements.

In performing an audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and *Government Auditing Standards*, we:

- Exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit.
- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, and design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks. Such procedures include examining, on a test basis, evidence regarding the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Regional Refuse Disposal District One's internal control. Accordingly, no such opinion is expressed.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluate the overall presentation of the financial statements.
- Conclude whether, in our judgment, there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the Regional Refuse Disposal District One's ability to continue as a going concern for a reasonable period of time.

We are required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit, significant audit findings, and certain internal control-related matters that we identified during the audit.

Required Supplementary Information

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that the management's discussion and analysis and the schedules of revenues and expenses budget and actual be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information is the responsibility of management and, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board, who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. We have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

Other Reporting Required by Government Auditing Standards

In accordance with Governmental Auditing Standards, we have also issued our report dated December 4, 2025 on our consideration of the Regional Refuse Disposal District One's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is solely to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the effectiveness of the Borough's internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with Government Auditing Standards in considering the Borough's internal control over financial reporting and compliance.

MANAGEMENT'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS
JUNE 30, 2025

The Management Discussion and Analysis (MD&A) offers the readers of the Regional Refuse Disposal District One (the "District") financial statements a narrative overview and analysis of the financial activities of the District for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2025. The information presented here should be considered in conjunction with the District's basic financial statements that follow this section. Wherever possible, reference to the financial statements is provided.

FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS

On a government-wide basis the District's assets of \$2,700,179 exceeded its liabilities at June 30, 2025, resulting in total net position of \$2,619,636. Unrestricted net position is \$1,966,852 which is available to meet ongoing government obligations. Of that amount \$1,966,852 is related to governmental activities, which include the General Fund.

The District's governmental funds, reported on a current financial resource's basis, combined ending fund balance of \$1,966,852, an increase of \$11,947 for the year. The General Fund operating deficit for the year was \$482,343. The General Fund balance was \$397,450, of which \$40,000 was reserved for subsequent years expenditures and \$16,857 was committed for unemployment reserve.

At the end of the current fiscal year, the unassigned fund balance for the general fund was \$380,593.

OVERVIEW OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

This discussion and analysis is intended to serve as an introduction to the District's basic financial statements. The District's basic financial statements are comprised of three components: 1) government-wide financial statements, 2) fund financial statements, and 3) notes to the financial statements. In addition to the basic financial statements, this report contains other supplementary information.

GOVERNMENT-WIDE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The government-wide financial statements are designed to provide readers with a broad overview of the District's finances, in a manner similar to a private sector business.

The statement of net position presents information on all of the District's assets and liabilities, with the difference between the two reported as net position. Over time, increases and decreases in net position may serve as a useful indicator of whether the financial position of the District is improving or deteriorating.

The statement of activities presents information showing how the District's net position changed during the most recent fiscal year. All changes in net position are reported as soon as the underlying event giving rise to the change occurs, regardless of the timing of related cash flows. Thus, revenues and expenses are reported in these statements for some items that will only result in cash flows in future fiscal periods (e.g., uncollected taxes and earned, but unused vacation leave).

Both of the government-wide financial statements distinguish functions of the District that are principally supported by taxes and intergovernmental revenues (government activities) from other functions that are intended to recover all or a significant portion of their costs through user fees and charges (business-type activities). The government activities of the District include refuse disposal and recycling.

The government-wide financial statements can be found on pages 10 - 11 of this report.

FUND FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

A fund is a grouping of related accounts that is used to maintain control over resources that have been segregated for special activities or objectives. The District, like other state and local governments, uses fund accounting to ensure and demonstrate compliance with finance related legal requirements. All of the funds of the District are considered to be governmental funds.

Governmental Funds

Governmental funds are used to account for essentially the same functions reported as governmental activities in the government-wide financial statements that is the District's most basic services. Unlike the government-wide financial statements, however, the funds focus on (1) cash and other financial resources that can be readily converted to cash flow in and out and (2) balances left at year-end that are available for spending. Consequently, the governmental fund statements provide a near or short-term view of the District's finances that may be useful in evaluating a government's near-term financing requirements.

Because the focus of governmental funds is narrower than that of the government-wide financial statements, it is useful to compare the information presented for governmental funds with similar information presented for governmental activities in the government-wide financial statements. By doing so, readers may better understand the long-term impact of government's near-term decisions. Both the governmental fund balance sheet and the governmental fund statement of revenues, expenditures, and changes in fund balance provide a reconciliation to facilitate this comparison between governmental funds and governmental activities.

The District maintains individual government funds. Information is presented separately in the governmental fund balance sheet and in the governmental fund statement of revenues, expenditures, and changes in fund balances for the general fund and the capital reserve fund, both of which are considered to be major funds. Data from the other governmental funds are combined into a single, aggregated presentation. Individual fund data for each of these non-major governmental funds is provided in the form of combining statements elsewhere in this report.

The District adopts an annual appropriated budget for its general funds. A budgetary comparison statement has been provided for the general fund to demonstrate compliance with the budget.

The basic governmental fund financial statements can be found on pages 12 - 16 of this report.

GOVERNMENT-WIDE FINANCIAL ANALYSIS

As noted earlier, net position may serve over time as a useful indicator of a government's financial position and an important determinant of its ability to finance services in the future. In the case of the District, assets exceeded liabilities by \$2,619,636 at the close of the most recent fiscal year.

Of the District's net position, its investment in capital assets (e.g., land, buildings, machinery, and equipment and vehicles) is \$652,784. It is presented in the statement of net position less any related debt used to acquire those assets to provide services to citizens; consequently, these assets are not available for future spending.

The District's net position increased by \$54,347 during the current fiscal year.

Governmental Activities.

Approximately 60% of the revenues were derived from charges for services, followed by 27% from town assessments, and 13% from other sources. Detailed revenue information can be found on page 27.

The increases in expenses was mainly attributed to a superfund costs.

FINANCIAL ANALYSIS OF THE FUND FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

As noted earlier, the District uses fund accounting to ensure and demonstrate compliance with finance-related legal requirements.

Governmental Funds.

The focus of the District's governmental funds is to provide information on near-term inflows, outflows, and balances of spendable resources. Such information is useful in assessing the District's financing requirements. In particular, unreserved fund balance may serve as a useful measure of a government's net resources for spending at the end of a fiscal year.

The General Fund is the chief operating fund of the District. At the end of the current fiscal year, the General Fund total fund balance was \$397,450. Of this total fund balance, \$16,857 is committed for unemployment reserve. The remaining balance of \$380,593 is unreserved and undesignated.

The fund balance of the District's General Fund decreased by \$482,343 during the current fiscal year. The main reason for this increase was transfers to the capital and building reserve funds.

GENERAL FUND BUDGETARY HIGHLIGHTS

During the year, total revenues were less than budgetary estimates by \$24,169 and expenditures were more than budgetary estimates by \$6,596. The District budget anticipated a deficit and utilization of fund balance of \$40,000 vs the actual operating deficit of \$70,765.

CAPITAL ASSET AND DEBT ADMINISTRATION

Capital Assets

The District's investment in capital assets (net of accumulated depreciation) for its governmental and as of June 30, 2025 amounted to \$652,784. This investment in capital assets included land, buildings and system improvements, machinery and equipment and vehicles.

ECONOMIC FACTORS AND THE NEXT YEAR'S BUDGETS AND RATES

On June 30, 2025, the District's Total General Fund Balance was \$397,450. The District held \$16,857 committed for unemployment reserve leaving an unassigned fund balance of \$380,593. None of this fund balance was utilized towards the 2025/2026 budget.

The District continues to fund an environmental monitoring reserve annually. This reserve is intended to fund the Superfund delisting expenses if the Superfund Trust Fund has insufficient funds to do so. It will also, if available, mitigate the increase in the operating budget for the continuation of ground water monitoring, required by Connecticut DEEP, when the Superfund process is terminated.

NOTE 1- SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The accompanying financial statements have been prepared in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAP) as applied to government units. The Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) is the accepted standard-setting body for establishing governmental accounting and financial reporting principles. The more significant of the District's accounting policies are described below.

Reporting Entity

Regional Refuse Disposal District One was formed in accordance with Sections 7-330, 7-331, 7-332 and 8-35(d) of the Connecticut General Statutes by the Towns of New Hartford, Barkhamsted, Colebrook and Winchester in May 1970. On February 26, 2001, the charter was amended to omit the town of Colebrook. The purpose of Regional Refuse Disposal District One was defined as collection and disposal of refuse.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that the reporting entity include (1) the primary government, (2) organizations for which the primary government is financially accountable and (3) other organizations for which the nature and significance of their relationship with the primary government are such that exclusion would cause the reporting entity's financial statements to be misleading or incomplete.

There are no organizations which have been excluded from the District's financial statements.

Government-Wide and Fund Financial Statements

The government-wide financial statements (i.e., the statement of net position and the statement of activities) report information on all of the non fiduciary activities of the District. For the most part, the effect of interfund activity has been removed from these statements. Governmental activities, which normally are supported by taxes and intergovernmental revenues, are reported separately from business-type activities, which rely to a significant extent on fees and charges for support.

The statement of activities demonstrates the degree to which the direct expenses of a function or segment are offset by program revenues. Direct expenses are those that are clearly identifiable with a specific function or segment. Program revenues include 1) charges to customers or applicants who purchase, use, or directly benefit from goods, services, or privileges provided by a given function or segment and 2) grants and contributions that are restricted to meeting the operational or capital requirements of a particular function or segment. Taxes and other items not properly included among program revenues are reported instead as general revenues.

Fund Financial Statements

The accounts of the District are organized and operated on the basis of funds. A fund is an independent fiscal and accounting entity with a self-balancing set of accounts comprised of assets, liabilities, fund equity, revenues and expenditures as applicable. Fund accounting segregates funds according to their intended purposes and is used to aid management in demonstrating compliance with financial and related legal and contractual provisions. Funds are defined as major or non-major in the basic financial statements according to GASB reporting standards, which categorize funds based on relative size and materiality. Major governmental

funds are reported are separate columns in the fund financial statements. The District maintains the following major governmental funds:

General Fund- the primary operating fund of the District. This fund is used to account for all financial transactions and resources except those required to be accounted for in another fund. Revenues are derived primarily from property taxes, state and federal grants, licenses, permits, charges for services, and interest income.

Capital Reserve Funds - account for all financial resources used for the acquisition or construction of major capital facilities. This includes the Capital Reserve Fund, the Building Reserve Fund, the Environmental Monitoring Reserve Fund and the Superfund Reserve Fund.

The District has no proprietary funds.

Measurement Focus Basis of Accounting, and Financial Statement Presentation

The government-wide financial statements are reported using the economic resources measurement focus and the accrual basis of accounting, as are the proprietary fund and fiduciary fund financial statements. Revenues are recorded when earned and expenses are recorded when a liability is incurred, regardless of the timing of related cash flows. Property taxes are recognized as revenues in the year for which they are levied. Grants and similar items are recognized as revenue as soon as all eligibility requirements imposed by the provider have been met.

Governmental fund financial statements are reported using the current financial resources measurement focus and the modified accrual basis of accounting. Revenues are recognized as soon as they are both measurable and available. Revenues are considered to be available when they are collectible within the current period or soon enough thereafter to pay liabilities of the current period.

Town assessments, charges for services, sticker fees and interest associated with the current fiscal period are all considered to be susceptible to accrual and so have been recognized as revenues of the current fiscal period. In determining when to recognize intergovernmental revenues (grants and entitlements), the legal and contractual requirements of the individual programs are used as guidance. Revenues are recognized when the eligibility requirements have been met. All other revenue items are considered to be measurable and available only when cash is received by the District or specifically identified.

Amounts reported as program revenues include 1) charges to customers or applicants for goods, services, or privileges provided, 2) operating grants and contributions, and 3) capital grants and contributions, including special assessments. Internally dedicated resources are reported as general revenues rather than as program revenues. Likewise, general revenues include all fees.

Expenditures generally are recorded when a liability is incurred, as under accrual accounting. However, debt service expenditures, as well as expenditures related to compensated absences and claims and judgments, are recorded only when payment is due.

When both restricted and unrestricted resources are available for use, it is the government's policy to use restricted resources first, then unrestricted resources as they are needed.

Accounting Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosures of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Cash Equivalents

The District classifies all highly liquid investments having original maturities of three months or less as cash equivalents.

Interfund Receivables, Payables, and Transactions

Activity between funds that are representative of lending/borrowing arrangements outstanding at the end of the fiscal year are referred to as "due to/from other funds" (i.e. the current portion of interfund loans) or "advances to/from other funds" (i.e. the non-current portion of interfund loans). Quasi-external transactions are accounted for as revenues, expenditures, or expenses. Transactions that constitute reimbursement to a fund for expenditures/expenses initially made from it that are properly applicable to another fund, are recorded as expenditures/expenses in the reimbursing fund and as reductions of expenditures/expenses in the fund that is reimbursed. All other interfund transactions are reported as transfers.

Receivables and Payables

All receivables are reported at their gross value and are reduced by the portion that is expected to be uncollectible. The receivables have been historically collected at nearly 100%. Any immaterial uncollectible amounts are written off as determined by the Administrator.

Capital Assets

Capital assets, which include property, plant, equipment, and infrastructure assets (e.g., roads, bridges, sidewalks, and similar items), are reported in the applicable governmental column in the government-wide financial statements. Capital assets are defined by the government as assets with an initial, individual cost of more than \$1,000 with an estimated useful life in excess of one year. Such assets are recorded at historical cost or estimated historical cost if purchased or constructed. Donated capital assets are recorded at fair value at the date of donation.

The costs of normal maintenance and repairs that do not add to the value of the asset or materially extend assets lives are not capitalized. Major outlays for capital assets and improvements are capitalized as projects are constructed.

Property, plant, equipment, and infrastructure assets of the District are depreciated using the straight-line method over the following estimated useful lives:

Deferred Outflows/Inflows of Resources

In addition to assets, the statement of net position will sometimes report a separate section for deferred outflows of resources. This separate financial statement element, deferred outflows of resources, represents a consumption of net position or fund balance that applies to a future period or periods and so will not be recognized as an outflow of resources (expense/expenditure) until then. The District reports a deferred charge on refunding in the government-wide statement of net position. The District had no financial statement elements meeting the criteria to be reported as deferred outflows of resources.

In addition to liabilities, the statement of net position will sometimes report a separate section for deferred inflows of resources. This separate financial statement element, deferred inflows of resources, represents an acquisition of net position or fund balance that applies to a future period or periods and so will not be recognized as an inflow of resources (revenue) until that time. The District had no financial statement elements meeting the criteria to be reported as deferred inflows of resources.

Compensated Absences

District employees are entitled to certain compensated absences based on their length of employment. The cost of vacation and sick leave is recognized when payments are made to employees. The amount of the liability for accrued vacation leave would not have a material effect on the District's financial statements; therefore, no liability has been recorded.

Fund Equity and Net Position

Equity in the government-wide financial statements is defined as "net position" and is classified in the following categories:

Net Investment in Capital Assets - this category groups all capital assets, including infrastructure, into one component of net position. Accumulated depreciation and the outstanding balances of debt that are attributable to the acquisition, construction or improvement of these assets reduce this category.

Restricted Net Position - This category presents external restrictions imposed by creditors, grantors, contributors or laws or regulations of other governments and restrictions imposed by law through constitutional provisions or enabling legislation.

Unrestricted Net Position - This category represents the net position of the District, which are not restricted for any project or other purpose.

The District has adopted the provisions of Governmental Accounting Standards Board Statement #54 (GASB 54), which defines the different types of fund balances that the District must use for its governmental funds. GASB 54 requires the fund balances to be properly reported within one of the following categories for financial reporting purposes.

Nonspendable Fund Balance – includes amounts that are not in spendable form or amounts that must be maintained intact legally or contractually. The criteria include items that are not expected to be converted to cash such as inventories, prepaid amounts and long term receivables.

Restricted Fund Balance – includes amounts that are restricted for specific purposes stipulated by external resource providers or through enabling legislation. Restrictions may effectively be changed or lifted only with the consent of resource providers.

Committed Fund Balance – includes amounts that can only be used for the specific purposes determined by a formal action of the District's highest level of decision making District. Commitments may be changed or lifted only by the same group taking the same formal action that imposed the constraint originally.

Assigned Fund Balance – includes amounts intended to be used by the District for specific purposes that do not meet the criteria to be classified as restricted or committed.

Unassigned Fund Balance – includes the general fund balance amount that is not classified as nonspendable, restricted, committed or assigned.

The District's policy is to apply expenditures against the applicable fund balances in the order of restricted, committed, assigned, and unassigned.

NOTE 2 – STEWARDSHIP, COMPLIANCE AND ACCOUNTABILITY

Budgets and Budgetary Accounting

The District adheres to the following procedures in establishing the budgetary data included in the general fund financial statements.

The Board presents an annual budget to a public hearing at which comments are obtained. The Board then adopts a budget and refers it to each member municipality.

Transfers must be approved by two-thirds vote of the Board. Additional appropriations must be presented and approved in the same manner as the original budget. There were no additional appropriations during the year.

The legal level of control at which expenditures may not exceed appropriations is at the department level.

Formal budgetary integration is employed as a management control during the year.

The budget includes contributions to the capital reserve and use of fund balance designations. The budget has been amended through line item transfers.

Basis differences are the effects of accrual adjustments for payables and receivables, interfund transfers and elimination of working capital amounts.

NOTE 3 – CASH DEPOSITS

Custodial Credit Risk

Deposit custodial credit risk is the risk that, in the event of a bank failure, the District will not be able to recover its deposits or will not be able to recover collateral securities that are in the possession of an outside party. The District does not have a deposit policy for custodial credit risk. As of June 30, 2025, \$1,545,778 of the District's bank balance of \$2,045,778 was exposed to custodial credit risk as follows:

All of the District's deposits were in qualified public institutions as defined by state statute. Under this statute, any bank holding public deposits must at all times maintain, segregated from its other assets, eligible collateral in an amount equal to a certain percentage of its public deposits. The applicable percentage is determined based on the bank's risk-based capital ratio. The amount of public deposits is determined based on either the public deposits reported on the most recent quarterly call reports, or the average of the public deposits reported on the four most recent quarterly call reports, whichever is greater. The collateral is kept in the custody of the trust department of either the pledging bank or another bank in the name of the pledging bank.

The level of the District's deposits varied significantly throughout the year as a result of higher cash flows during certain periods of the year. As a result, uninsured, uncollateralized amounts at those times were substantially higher than at year-end.

Concentrations of Credit Risk

The District does not have a policy that limits the amounts invested in any one issuer.

Interest Rate Risk

The District does not have a formal investment policy that limits investment maturities as a means of managing its exposure to fair losses arising from increasing interest rates.

NOTE 8 - POST EMPLOYMENT AND HEALTHCARE BENEFITS

The District does not provide post-employment healthcare benefits except those mandated by the Consolidated Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act (COBRA). The requirements established by COBRA are fully funded by employees who elect coverage under the act, and no direct costs are incurred by the District.

NOTE 9 - RISK MANAGEMENT

The District is exposed to various risks of loss involving torts, theft of, damage to, and destruction of assets, errors and omissions, injuries of employees, natural disaster, and public official liabilities. The District generally obtains commercial insurance for these risks and any claims have not exceeded commercial coverage.

NOTE 10 – MAJOR FUNDING SOURCES

The District's three funding sources account for approximately 27% of total revenues. The revenues are assessments to the towns of Barkhamsted, New Hartford and Winchester for collection and disposal of waste.

NOTE 11 – CONTINGENT LIABILITIES

The District's landfill was named a Superfund site in 1990. It was capped under EPA oversight in 1999. The District is a potentially responsible party (PRP) and has negotiated with other PRPs and the EPA to fund the long-term monitoring and maintenance activities at the site. The District has settled its liability for the Remedial/Feasibility Study and the EPA has approved a long-term natural attenuation and monitoring program as the final remedy for the site. The annual financial obligation for this long-term work is being funded by amounts obtained in grant funds and assessed to other PRPs and set aside in a trust fund for these activities.

Based on the trust agreement, the potential liability to the District is \$964,720 through December 31, 2022. The District has funded \$756,936, which includes \$445,768 in the Superfund Reserve Account and \$311,168 in in-kind services. In addition, the District will fund annually, through the operating budget, transfers to the Superfund Reserve Account as deemed necessary by the Board of Directors. However, based on the amount remaining in the Trust fund at June 30, 2025, the Board of Directors believes that no additional liability to the District will occur.

NOTE 12 – PENSION PLAN

The District maintains a non-contributory pension plan, the "Regional Refuse Disposal District One Retirement Plan" covering full-time employees. The plan was established and may be amended by the governing Board. Contributions are made by the employer only and totaled \$26,921 for the fiscal year. Due to the nature of the plan, there is no unfunded liability.

NOTE 13 – SUBSEQUENT EVENTS

Management has evaluated subsequent events from the financial statement date of June 30, 2025 through December 4, 2025, which is the date these financial statements were available to be issued. All subsequent events requiring recognition or disclosure have been incorporated into these financial statements.

NOTE 14 – PRONOUNCEMENTS ISSUED, NOT YET EFFECTIVE

The Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) has issued several pronouncements that have effective dates that may impact future presentations. Management has not currently determined what, if any, impact implementation of the following statements may have on the financial statements:

- **GASB Statement No. 103, *Financial Reporting Model Improvements*.** The objective of this Statement is to improve key components of the financial reporting model to enhance its effectiveness in providing information that is essential for decision making and assessing a government's accountability. This Statement also addresses certain application issues. The requirements of this statement are effective for the District's reporting period beginning July 1, 2025.
- **GASB Statement No. 104, *Disclosure of Certain Capital Assets*.** The objective of this Statement is to provide users of government financial statements with essential information about certain types of capital assets. This Statement requires certain types of capital assets to be disclosed separately in the capital assets note disclosures required by Statement 34. Lease assets recognized in accordance with Statement No. 87, *Leases*, and intangible right-to-use assets recognized in accordance with Statement No. 94, *Public-Private and Public-Public Partnerships and Availability Payment Arrangements*, should be disclosed separately by major class of underlying asset in the capital as-sets note disclosures. Subscription assets recognized in accordance with Statement No. 96, *Subscription-Based Information Technology Arrangements*, also should be separately disclosed. In addition, this Statement requires intangible assets other than those three types to be disclosed separately by major class. This Statement also requires additional disclosures for capital assets held for sale. The requirements of this statement are effective for the District's reporting period beginning July 1, 2026.

Independent Auditors' Report on Internal Control over Financial Reporting and on
Compliance and Other Matters Based on an Audit of Financial Statements
Performed in Accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*

To the Board of Directors
Regional Refuse Disposal District One

We have audited, in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States, the financial statements of the governmental activities and each major fund as of and for the year ended June 30, 2025, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the Regional Refuse Disposal District One's basic financial statements, and have issued our report thereon dated December 4, 2025.

Internal Control over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements, we considered the Regional Refuse Disposal District One's internal control over financial reporting (internal control) to determine the audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Regional Refuse Disposal District One's internal control. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the Regional Refuse Disposal District One's internal control.

A deficiency in internal control exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect and correct, misstatements on a timely basis. A material weakness is a deficiency, or combination of deficiencies, in internal control such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the Regional Refuse Disposal District One's financial statements will not be prevented, or detected and corrected, on a timely basis. A significant deficiency is a deficiency, or combination of deficiencies, in internal control that is less severe than a material weakness, yet important enough to merit attention by those charged with governance.

Our consideration of internal control was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control that might be material weaknesses or significant deficiencies. Given these limitations, during our audit we did not identify any deficiencies in internal control that we consider to be material weaknesses. However, material weaknesses may exist that have not been identified.

Compliance and Other Matters

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether the Regional Refuse Disposal District One's financial statements are free from material misstatement, we performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grant agreements, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit, and, accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed no instances of noncompliance or other matters that are required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards*.

Purpose of This Report

The purpose of this report is solely to describe the scope of our testing of internal control and compliance and the result of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the effectiveness of the Regional Refuse Disposal District One's internal control or on compliance. This report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* in considering the Regional Refuse Disposal District One's internal control and compliance. Accordingly, this communication is not suitable for any other purpose.
